In answer to your request I beg leave to sub-

of November 1827 up to this time, including sums paid to account  
of the Parochial erections at Ulig & Government Church at Nels,  
but exclusive of other accounts paid, due on the Estate, Ministers  
stipends & schoolmasters salaries & the expense of management all  
which are paid up to the term of Whitsunday last and as will  
appear particularly from the Account of Antromissions to be  
rendered.

The quantity of kelp shipped from the Three Parishes this season, was 523 Tons 1 Cwt of 22½ cwt to the Ton equal to 553 Tons of Liverpool kelp weight beside the quantity that should proceed from the Country weight at weighing out at Liverpool.

It is to be observed that there was a great drawback on the Rent, owing to the Balances for work & fishing in the tenants favor as appears by their former accounts, inasmuch they were necessitated to buy meal for their support. The crop throughout the Island is very good this season & even some of the big tenants inform me that they can sell potatoes besides having sufficiency for their families, which may be attributed, under Divine Blessing to the little Breasman your lady orders them to get last spring.
